Background and Alternatives Explored:

The 44 Ranch Park was constructed in 2009 but the playground equipment was left to be chosen and installed by the neighborhood. In 2017, through a generous donation a large composite play structure designed for 5-12 year old children was installed in the playground. The remainder of the playground remained empty, awaiting funding to be raised. In 2019 Parks & Recreation, working with the neighborhood requested funding to complete the playground in the 2020 CIP. The selected playground equipment was chosen by Parks & Recreation and the neighborhood in order to provide a complete playground that addresses the 8 types of play developed by the national institute for play, and specifically provides play options for younger children aged 2-5. This equipment is being purchased through the U.S. Communities Government Purchasing Alliance, a cooperative purchasing program.

Financial Implications:

The neighborhood has raised \$11,902 from grants and donations. Council approved \$64,500 in the 2020 CIP for the playground. Parks and Recreation staff are still working with the equipment manufacturer to secure an estimate for installation of the equipment, under a separate future contract.
